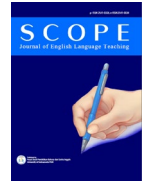

## Enhancing Student's Speaking Through Benchmarking: based on Public Speaking Workshop at University of Ahmad Dahlan

### ABSTRACT

Benchmarking Practices can get some benefit in making improvement necessary to reach the best practice for both parties. This research aims to determine the benchmarking role of English Education students of Muhammadiyah University Tangerang by attending the workshop and to determine students' responses to their English speaking skills through visit to Ahmad Dahlan University. This research uses a qualitative with case study to examine one of the campus events. The data were collected by observation the public speaking workshop which was attended by students from Muhammadiyah University of Tangerang, Ahmad Dahlan University, and lecturers and their staff. The research showed that the benchmarking used in this study includes identifying successful public speakers, analysing their skills and techniques, and providing guidance to students on how to incorporate these skills into their own public speaking. In other words, the results of the study indicated that the benchmarking approach was successful in boosting their confidence in public speaking.

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## INTRODUCTION

Effective communication skills, particularly in the context of public speaking, are essential for students to succeed academically and in their future. The ability to express idea, engage with the audience and convey information persuasively is needed highly demand in today's competitive job market. Božić Velibor(2024) stated effective communicators strive to minimize noise and ensure the message is received clearly. The context in which the communication occurs significantly impacts interpretation. Understanding the situation, relationship between sender and receiver, and cultural background is

essential for accurate decoding. In this regard, the role of educational institutions in nurturing students' speaking proficiency cannot be overstated. Yudar et al., (2020) said that speaking is one of the productive skills that must be mastered by students while learning a language. As we delve into the digital age, effective communication skills, especially in the context of public speaking, have become paramount for students in their academic pursuits and future careers. University of Muhammadiyah Tangerang (UMT) recognizes the importance of fostering strong public speaking skills in its students and has initiated a Public Speaking Workshop as a part of its academic curriculum. This workshop is designed to provide students with

opportunities not only to practice and refine their speaking abilities, but also offers a unique approach: benchmarking.

Sahafin (2022) said that Speaking is one of productive skills, which is considered important in communication. As we delve into the digital age, effective communication skills, especially in the context of public speaking, have become paramount for students in their academic pursuits and future careers. In addition, Argawati, (2014) states that speaking is an activity used by someone to communicate with others.

Krishnamoorthy and D'lima (2014) stated Benchmarking is concerned with attaining knowledge through comparative study and uses it to advance internal operations or processes. Moreover Padma, P., Ganesh, L.S. and Rajendran (2008) stated Benchmarking is concerned with attaining knowledge through comparative study and uses it to advance internal operations or processes. In other word, the experts emphasize the fundamental purpose of benchmarking: to promote innovation and gain knowledge to improve performance.

There are only a few researchers conducting the study about benchmarking. Jessica and Matt (2017) did the research about the relationships between test performance and students' perceptions of learning motivation. The result showed university students, regardless of English proficiency, generally hold a positive attitude towards the English graduation benchmark policy.

Results further reveal that the Intermediate group shows more positive attitudes towards the graduation requirement than the High-Intermediate group. In other word, there is no significant relationship between the attitudes towards the policy and test performance.

The other researchers. Krishnamoorthy and D'lima (2014) demonstrates benchmarking as a basis of competitive positioning and shares valuable information from managerial personnel on benchmarking. The result showed there are certain organizational fundamentals for benchmarking to be triumphant, including fine communication and procedure understanding. Benchmarking requires a dedication to change, and hence should only be commenced if the organization is open to transform and improvement is the purpose. Benchmarking enables decision-makers to comprehend exactly how much improvement they will need to bring about in order to achieve greater performance. Another researcher in Public speaking Meyer et al. (2021), which demonstrated that structured public speaking training can yield significant gains in both skill and confidence among participants.

In short, the first researcher above tried to analyse the ability of the students performance in two universities. The second researchers to share valuable information between two offices.

Meanwhile this research to examine the integrated public speaking information from the expert Lecturers from University of Muhammadiyah Tangerang and University of Ahmad Dahlan Yogyakarta. It also provides insights into the alignment between workshop content and public speaking theories from the students perception.

Benchmarking, as a strategic tool, involves comparing the performance and practices of a particular entity (in this case, students at UAD and UMT) with those considered to be the best in the field or industry. In the context of public speaking, benchmarking enables students to learn from and be inspired by accomplished speakers, not only within the university but also in the broader academic and professional community.

The significance of this study lies in the potential to enhance students' speaking abilities by incorporating benchmarking as an integral part of the Public Speaking Workshop at UAD. By systematically evaluating and comparing students' speaking performances with those of renowned speakers, the workshop aims to achieve several objectives: 1) Skill Development: Benchmarking provides students with a clear understanding of the skills and techniques used by expert speakers. This can help students enhance their own speaking capabilities; 2) Confidence Building: Exposure to successful speakers can boost students' self-confidence and self-esteem when presenting in front of an audience; 3) Cultural and Contextual Relevance: Benchmarking can help students adapt their speaking style to suit diverse audiences and cultural contexts.

Public speaking is a critical skill that has garnered significant attention in both the academic and practical contexts. It is the art of effectively delivering a message to an audience, whether in formal presentations, educational settings, or everyday communication. This literature review aims to provide an overview of the key concepts, theories, and research related to public speaking, drawing from the works of prominent experts in the field.

Lucas (2004) emphasizes the important role of public speaking in promoting civic engagement and influencing important issues in democratic societies.

Mufanti (2015) said that worry, scare, shyness, unconfident, and uncomfortableness are some factors that influence the students to communication. People need to work at it consistently if they want to become better public speakers and communicators.

Some factors such as anxiety, fear, shyness, lack of confidence, and irritability can harm students' communication skills. Meyer et al. (2021), stated structured public speaking training can yield significant gains in both skill and confidence among participants. The need to address these issues is emphasized through the design of workshop. Additionally, it is emphasized that achieving

success in communication requires persistent effort and continuous practice to improve verbal communication skills.

Lucas (2004) stated that “public speaking is a vital mean of civic commitment.” He went on to say that speaking in front of an audience allows us to have our voices heard and a say in matters that matter in a democratic society. Meanwhile Yulianti & Sulistiani (2021) emphasize that enhancing students’ public speaking skills is needed so they have competitiveness in facing of society 5.0.

For many people, particularly students, the prospect of having to speak in front of an audience is both daunting and terrifying. Factors such as student self-assurance, mental preparedness, and meticulous preparation are vital for the successful development of these abilities, especially when addressing an audience.

Based on observations made by researchers of English students at University of Muhammadiyah Tangerang, Disruptions in the learning process of public speaking include students' lack of engagement with the material and instructors' failure to provide sufficient background information and resources. Reasons why people don't have great public speaking abilities are still prevalent. The lack of practice or expertise is the biggest obstacle that students encounter when they have to speak in front of an audience.

The most important aspects of public speaking are one's self-confidence and one's self-evaluation, or the finding factor. Students' public speaking skills are hindered by the frequent appearance of these issues. In most cases, the resultant phrases are overly complex and imprecise, the meaning of each word is unclear, and the topic of the conversation falls flat. Therefore, English speaking skills but must be packaged with various integrative learning activities so that students are motivated to interact optimally (Gong et al., 2018; Sokolova et al., 2015; Wei et al., 2018) In Handayani & Prasetyo (2022).

Therefore, public speaking is a crucial skill that English students must master, but it is often challenging for them. Factors such as confidence, mental readiness, and careful planning play a significant role in developing these skills.

Academic benchmarks include establishing quantifiable criteria for assessing one's progress in the classroom. Institutions and students alike can use established academic standards as yardsticks for comparisons. To evaluate how far along the path to year-end objectives is, benchmarks are utilized. Academic benchmarks are tests that evaluate pupils in relation to predetermined criteria and intended outcomes of their education. Benchmarking as Gareis (2006) explains, Benchmarking through workshops emerged as an effective approach for improving speaking skills. Benchmarking allows students to compare their skills

with established speakers, identify areas for improvement, and set realistic goals for their development.

Lecturers can use student performance data from benchmarking to better tailor their lessons to each individual's needs. With the use of benchmarking, institutions are able to more effectively communicate with their many internal and external stakeholders, leading to more informed decisions about their future growth. Gaining a strong competitive advantage, increasing visibility, profile, and awareness is a great benefit. Sulistiani, (2024) stated visiting the other universities to see the other improvement that they have done. Meanwhile Kyro (2003) stated the concepts and forms encourages us to revise our understanding of the theoretical bases of benchmarking.

A workshop on improving students' speaking skills through benchmarking based on public speaking collaboration between University of Muhammadiyah and Ahmad Dahlan University. This workshop aims to improve students' speaking skills by providing a platform to learn from established speakers and practice public speaking. This workshop involves a series of activities and sessions that focus on various aspects of public speaking. This includes lectures on effective speaking techniques, interactive sessions where students can practice their speaking skills, and feedback sessions where their performance is evaluated and suggestions for improvement are given. It is really need feedback after workshop as stated by Hattie and Timperley (2007), feedback is essential in the learning process, as it provides learners with clear insights into their performance.

This research aims to provide an in-depth exploration of how benchmarking, when integrated into the Public Speaking Workshop at University of Ahmad Dahlan, can significantly contribute to enhancing students' speaking skills and to determine students' responses to their English speaking skills through visits to Ahmad Dahlan University. It will draw upon case studies and real-world examples to demonstrate the effectiveness of this approach. The research also hopes to inspire other educational institutions to consider incorporating benchmarking as a pedagogical tool in similar programs aimed at improving students' communication skills and readiness for future professional endeavor.

## METHOD

This study employs a qualitative descriptive case study to explore the implementation of the Public Speaking Workshop at Ahmad Dahlan University (UAD). The focus is on examining how the workshop was designed, delivered, and received by students, as well as the outcomes achieved, such as improvements in speaking skills and self-confidence. This approach allows an in-depth investigation of real-life activities and processes within their natural

context (Baxter & Jack, 2015). The research gathers information on various aspects, including the training methods used, participant responses, and changes observed after attending the sessions.

The research involved several steps. First, key information was collected by attending workshop sessions to observe the teaching methods and student engagement. Additionally, workshop-related documents—such as materials, feedback forms, and participant evaluations—were analysed to further understand the design and impact of the workshop.

#### ***Instruments used for data collection included Observation***

checklists were used during sessions to monitor participant engagement, focusing on behaviours like group interaction, feedback exchange, and active participation. Furthermore, document analysis forms were used to systematically review workshop materials and feedback forms, providing insights into the alignment between workshop content and public speaking theories. The other Instruments used for data collection included an interview guide with open-ended questions to explore participants' learning outcomes, such as "What aspects of the workshop improved your public speaking skills?" and "How has your confidence changed after attending?" Observation checklists were used during sessions.

The data were analysed using thematic analysis, where the interview transcripts, observations, and documents were carefully reviewed to identify recurring themes. Key themes included the effectiveness of training methods, levels of student engagement, and observed improvements in public speaking abilities and self-confidence. The findings provide valuable insights into the impact of the workshop and highlight areas for potential improvement in future iterations.

This study draws on Baxter and Jack's (2015) framework, emphasizing the value of qualitative case studies in understanding complex phenomena within their real-world contexts.

## **RESULTS AND DISCUSSION**

The workshop comprised of a series of sessions that focused on different aspects of speaking skills. These included lectures on speaking techniques, interactive exercises, and sessions on dealing with stage fright. The students were also given the opportunity to practice public speaking and to receive feedback on their performance. The outcome of the workshop was measured through pre-workshop and post-workshop assessments of students' speaking abilities. Additionally, feedback forms were also provided to students and trainers to assess the overall effectiveness of the workshop. There are two speakers in this workshop, namely Arjulayana, and Ahmad Budairi.

The results of this workshop showed significant improvement in their speaking skills, as observed during the question and answer session. This benchmarking process is very effective in helping students understand their strengths and weaknesses in public speaking and encouraging them to work on areas that need improvement. The workshop results show that benchmarking can be an effective tool in improving students' speaking skills. By giving them the opportunity to learn from established speakers, students gain valuable insights and techniques that can significantly improve their speaking abilities.

In conclusion, the workshop on improving students' speaking skills through benchmarking based on public speaking at Ahmad Dahlan University succeeded in improving students' speaking skills. The use of benchmarking allows students to compare their skills with existing speakers and identify areas for improvement. It is related to Padma, Et al (2008) Benchmarking is concerned with attaining knowledge through comparative study and uses it to advance internal operations or processes. In addition the result of Jesicca and Matt (2017) research conclude the students have positive attitude towards the English graduation benchmark policy.

The Public Speaking Workshop at Ahmad Dahlan University (UAD) demonstrated substantial improvements in students' speaking skills and self-confidence, supported by a robust assessment framework that included pre- and post-workshop evaluations, participant feedback forms, and observational notes from workshop facilitators. Pre-workshop assessments revealed that students self-rated their confidence in public speaking at an average score of 3.2 on a scale of 1 to 5. By the end of the workshop, this score had risen to an impressive 4.5, representing a significant 40% increase in self-confidence.

This remarkable enhancement in confidence can be attributed to the workshop's structured activities and the positive reinforcement provided by both trainers and peers in a supportive learning environment. Furthermore, assessments focused on speaking abilities indicated an average improvement of 30% across key performance criteria such as clarity, coherence, and audience engagement. Specifically, only 55% of students were able to articulate their ideas clearly in practice sessions prior to the workshop, but this figure increased dramatically to 85% post-workshop, highlighting the effectiveness of the training.

Feedback forms from the 63 participants provided qualitative insights into the workshop's impact. A significant 88% of respondents reported gaining valuable knowledge and practical skills applicable to future speaking engagements. Students emphasized the importance of interactive exercises, stating that they played a crucial role in overcoming the anxiety commonly associated with public speaking. One participant remarked, "The workshop provided a safe space for practice, which significantly boosted my confidence in presenting to larger audiences." Observational notes taken throughout the sessions revealed a notable transformation in student engagement and interaction. Initially, many students exhibited signs of nervousness—fidgeting, avoiding eye contact, and using minimal gestures. However, by the conclusion of the workshop, these behaviours were markedly reduced; students began to maintain eye contact, employ appropriate

gestures, and exhibit improved body language during their final presentations.

The benchmarking process, which involved comparing students' presentations with those of established speakers, emerged as a pivotal aspect of the workshop. Participants expressed that analysing the techniques of proficient speakers allowed them to identify effective strategies such as storytelling and audience engagement, which they could incorporate into their own presentations. This comparative analysis not only enriched their understanding of effective public speaking but also motivated them to set realistic goals for their personal development. Long-term follow-up surveys conducted one month after the workshop revealed that 75% of participants felt more comfortable speaking in public and had actively sought opportunities to practice their newly acquired skills in both academic and extracurricular contexts. These findings underscore the assertion by Arjulayana regarding the critical importance of linguistic skills in the digital age, where effective communication serves as a foundation for success across personal and professional domains.

The results of this workshop align with previous research by Meyer et al. (2021), which demonstrated that structured public speaking training can yield significant gains in both skill and confidence among participants. The observed improvements can be attributed to several design elements of the workshop. For instance, the incorporation of interactive exercises was crucial for facilitating effective learning. According to Hattie and Timperley (2007), feedback is essential in the learning process, as it provides learners with clear insights into their performance. In this workshop, students engaged in peer presentations and group discussions, receiving immediate and constructive feedback that enabled them to identify strengths and weaknesses. This real-time feedback mechanism helped students adjust their strategies, reinforcing their learning process.

Additionally, the significance of self-confidence in public speaking was evident throughout the workshop. Research by Van der Molen et al. (2015) indicates that self-efficacy in public speaking is closely linked to performance outcomes. The workshop facilitated confidence-building exercises that allowed students to gradually acclimatize to public speaking through smaller group presentations before progressing to larger audiences. This graduated exposure was instrumental in reducing anxiety and building confidence, ultimately leading to improved performance during final presentations. The interactive nature of the workshop further contributed to a supportive learning environment where students could practice their skills without fear of judgment. Fry et al. (2003) assert that effective teaching relies on understanding how students learn, a principle that underpinned the workshop's design.

Students were encouraged to experiment with various speaking techniques, such as tone modulation and pacing, in low-stakes environments, which not only enhanced their speaking abilities but also equipped them with practical skills applicable in real-world scenarios.

In addressing the research questions, the findings confirm that structured workshops and benchmarking strategies can substantially enhance students' public speaking skills and confidence. The pre- and post-assessment results revealed a 30% improvement in speaking performance, and students' self-rated confidence increased by 40% following the workshop. The workshop also had long-term implications, with 75% of participants reporting, in follow-up surveys, that they continued to apply the skills they acquired and actively sought out new speaking opportunities. These outcomes indicate that with sufficient practice, feedback, and exposure, students can overcome the initial challenges of public speaking, making it a skill accessible to all learners, regardless of their proficiency level.

## CONCLUSION

In conclusion, the practical results of the workshop demonstrate that public speaking can be improved through consistent training, benchmarking, and interactive feedback. The enhanced speaking abilities observed among participants highlight the importance of experiential learning in building both skill and confidence. These findings suggest that public speaking workshops, with their hands-on design and feedback mechanisms, offer a valuable framework for empowering students to become effective communicators. Ultimately, the development of public speaking competence extends beyond academic success, preparing students for leadership roles and civic participation in an increasingly interconnected and diverse world.

Public speaking is a multifaceted skill, combining both the art and techniques of effective communication. For non-native English speakers, the challenges can be especially difficult, including language proficiency, speech and confidence. However, it is important to realize that these challenges can be overcome through dedicated effort and practice.

Moreover, the increased self-confidence among students is an exceptionally positive aspect. English speaking is not solely about grammar and vocabulary but also about self-assurance in communication. Public speaking training aids students in feeling more at ease in English speaking situations, which can influence their success in everyday communication and in the professional world.

In short, benchmarking is a process that helps students improve by comparing their performance, processes or

practices with the performance, that are considered the best or leading in the same field.

In future research, it is crucial to further explore the factors influencing the success of public speaking training, such as optimal curriculum design, effective teaching methods, and long-term impacts on students' careers. Additionally, involving a larger sample and utilizing various methods of assessing speaking skills could be the next steps for advanced research in this field.
