- 4. Caring for other living things and the environment.

Based on those four kinds of moral Value, the researcher constructed the analysis card as follows:

Techniques of Data Collection

The second highest is the secondary character with the second-highest percentage value of 24%, which has a significant role and influences the main character. Sympathetic Via makes the audience want to get the happiness that is rarely found in her family. The antagonist has the lowest percentage, 7 %. This is because the antagonist character is displayed not too often. This family genre movie also features many school children, so that the role of the antagonist is raised a little as a small example of the problems that often exist in schools. If there are too many antagonist characters, it is feared that it will lead to negative perceptions on the audience that is still a child. It can cause us to regret if one-day things happen that are not desirable. Self-respect and humility, self-discipline, and acceptance of personal responsibility are 32%, almost close to the first position. The movie teaches a lot about how a person must respect themselves and care for those around them. August, who has a disorder, makes us have to be grateful for what God has given us. A healthy and perfect body is something we sometimes forget to be thankful for. Likewise, when we have deficiencies, we should not be discouraged or ashamed because life must be faced if we want to survive. We should not pay too much attention to people who can only insult others because everyone will be held accountable for their actions. Commitment to something greater than oneself is 27%; the percentage is relatively high because many advised that it is essential to commit to good things in the movie about family. Much dialogue shows how the audience is advised to have an exemplary commitment in life because being committed will make us quality in life. Caring for other living things and the environment is the lowest percentage is 5 %; it shows the Pullman family dog does not have a role but shows the Pullman family who loves animals like their own family. Pullman's family's affection for their pet dog was seen when their dog was sick.

Conclusions

There are six kinds of characters in the movie "Wonder" by Stephen Chbosky. They are protagonist character, antagonist character, a secondary character, extras character, round character, and flat character. The protagonist is the most dominant character in the movie with a percentage of 36 %, and a secondary character is 24 %, an extra character is 12%, the round character is 12 %, a flat character is 10 %, and the antagonist is 7 %—moral Value in "Wonder" by Stephen Chbosky. The protagonist's character shows the highest rate of 36 %. Even though the protagonist and antagonist are hostile to each other, no use of weapons or objects is painful for a fight because it is still a genre of children. The protagonist shown in the story is verbal bullying conducted by young school children to their schoolmates.

There are seven moral values in the movie "Wonder" by Stephen Chbosky, they are respectful and caring for others is 35 %, Self-respect, but with humility, self-discipline and acceptance of personal responsibility is 32 %, Commitment to something greater than oneself 27 % and Caring for the other living things and environment is 15 %. Respect and caring for others show the highest percentage of all moral values that arise in the movie because, in the beginning, Von Trapp's children could not respect others, so
